## The Wisdom of Melvin Lytton

"To determine anvil height, bring your favorite hammer down on anvil. Adjust the anvil height so the hammer hits flat with comfortable arm and wrist motion."

"The hammer handle is important. A longer and thinner handle is better so there is some flexing."

"Use heavy blows when metal is hottest. Use lighter finishing blows on colder metal."

"Use the reins of the tongs as a spring fuller. Then make a replacement set of tongs."

"Work wrought iron so hot it is almost giving off sparks, i.e., white hot!

"When necessary, use belly fat to hold the metal!"

"Most things happen on the edge of the anvil."

"To get power from your hammer, stand back, grip the hammer near the end of the handle with your thumb to the side of the handle and your butt back."

"Surface smoothing occurs on the anvil side of the work piece."

"When hammering, hit the same spot on the anvil - move the work!"

"If you need more metal, push it out from the center of the work piece."

"Showing hammer marks is a modern concept. In the old days they wanted everything to look perfect."

"The horn of the anvil always belongs on your hammer hand side. That way it's easier to work on the horn of the anvil and your hammer hand tends to stay away from any tool in the hardy hole."
