Last Month's Meeting

The September meeting was an open forge session and had ten attendees. A number of important topics where covered in the business meeting that will be presented here on an ongoing basis. Much of the terminology is mine and I would like to hear any objections or suggestions for improvement.

Treasurer's Report: As of July 30, 2004 the Guild had \$3,807 on account. The Kentucky Blacksmith Supply sent the Guild a check for \$150 as a contribution from sales at the Illiana show. September's Iron in the hat brought in \$68.

The attending membership of the September meeting approved spending up to \$500 of Guild funds to obtain a demonstrator for the IBA meeting. Ted is willing to commit \$200 of

personal funds toward this expense. Other contributions accepted.

Guildhall Update: The form and placement of a building at the Illiana show grounds (our Guild Hall) is still not settled. The present suggested form is as a shelter type building with a central powered vent, to which solid walls can be added later.

Bite-Sized Knowledge

This space I intend to be educational. I will start with the most basic subjects and build up. Any subject that you would like to see addressed can be covered. If you have no input the choice is mine. Someone will answer any questions submitted. I cannot guarantee how soon there will be an answer, but I will not give up.

Fuel for the Forge

This is one of the most basic essentials for the smith. There are three traditional forge fuels: Coal, Coke, and Charcoal. This is an introduction to fire and will be continued next month.

Coal: Coal is a mineral that is formed from ancient plants and animals by heat and pressure. It is mostly carbon with whatever impurities were in the plants, animals, or whatever was supplying the heat and pressure.

Coke: Coke is coal that has been heated without exposure to Oxygen. The impurities have boiled out to some extent.

Charcoal: Charcoal is wood that has been treated as coke has been treated.

Both coke and charcoal have to be heated above the temperature they were made at to start to burn. When coal is ignited the lower burn temperature impurities are what starts to burn. When the more volatile impurities are already gone the fire burns at a higher temperature but has to get to a higher temperature to start to burn. Coal lights at the lowest temperature, but burns at the lowest temperature. Charcoal and coke are harder to light but burn hotter. How much harder to light and burn depends on processing temperature.
