Bottom line: bring money Saturday to pay your deposit against the forge build. The amount can vary from \$25 on

up to \$100. Based on recent estimates we think it will total out at around \$100 for a forge with a value between \$650 and \$700

Hoping the weather will allow some of you to work on the coal forges outside and a few inside, while we have those working to develop the gas forge templates and jigs.

Iron-in-the-Hat will be one to remember if all of you do what you can to make it that way. I plan on loading it down this month. It may take two tables to hold it all, so come prepared to take home prize pieces.

As usual we will start at 8:30 A.M. with coffee and doughnuts followed at 9:15 with a meeting on the gas forge build, then off to the races.
