Then he said he owns a fabrication shop that generates 20,000 pounds of scrap per week or month and that we could have whatever we want. Thinking it would be cutoffs and just small pieces we might be able to use, I went to his factory and was pleasantly surprised, he has long pieces and short pieces of a lot of stock that we can use. On that first visit I brought back 200 sticks of 1/2 inch round 10 feet long. Pieces of strap from 1 1/2 to 4" wide, sticks of 3/4" square stock and many other items. My truck was dragging the ground. I will continue to salvage what I can for the group. A rack has been setup to store the metal and will be available to you members as needed. We also have the tool steel donated by the Purdue foundry group. We must be very grateful to our benefactors. More about this at the next meeting.
