This is a chance to go back in time a 100 years and see how fancy carriages (like the Queen of England uses) were built. He makes everything in his shops, all the metal parts are forged by hand, the wood is cut, cured and sawed for the parts. They make the wheels from scratch and do all the lacquering, striping, etc.



Don't miss this one! Harley and his brother are getting up in the years so this shop will not be open many more years. You may never get this opportunity again!

January's meeting on nail making was a huge amount of fun. There were about 20 blacksmiths present and many made nails of various shapes and designs.

Some of those nail makers (Kim Soladine, Jim Johnson, Bill Newman, Jeff Rattray, and Dominick Andrisani) placed their decorative nails in the new nail post pictured below.



We hope will get decorative nails from many more blacksmiths from around the state and region. The post will become a showcase for blacksmith work that is both utilitarian and attractive. Smiths who place a nail on the post must also sign the post register and indicate which nail is theirs.

## Mokume Gane

Mokume Gane is a laminate made out of many layers of different color metals. The idea is similar to the patterning effect of Damascus steel only the metals in Mokume Gane tend to be more precious and colorful, like silver, gold and copper. Jewelry made of Mokume Gane has a very attractive patterned color. Check out the jewelry web sites listed below. The literal translation of Mokume Gane in Japanese is “wood-grain metal”.



At our January meeting Jim Johnson demonstrated how to make Mokume Gane out of five quarters. The result is pictured above.
